

## **Veterans Administration Voluntary Service (VAVS) Program**

### **Description:**

Founded in 1946 by the Federal Government, the Veterans Administration Voluntary Service (VAVS) program assists veteran patients through volunteer work in community-based volunteer programs, hospital wards, nursing homes, VA Medical Centers, and veteran outreach centers. VAVS is the organizing force that brings compassionate Americans into veterans' health facilities to improve the veteran life.

JWV's first National Representative was officially certified in 1946 to the National VAVS Advisory Committee, which meets annually to coordinate and discuss obstacles like getting more volunteers. Volunteering offers an opportunity and a challenge to the Jewish War Veteran to put into practice the admonition, "I am my brother's keeper."

### **VAVS Representatives and Deputy Representatives**

Each VA facility must have four VAVS advisory meetings per year and one Representative or Deputy from each participating VSO must be present at one of every three meetings or the organization risks losing its certification.

JWV's National Certifying Officer (the VAVS National Committee Chair) certifies the local representative (1) and Deputy Representatives (up to 3) for all VA facilities at which JWV volunteers. Their terms run indefinitely. Department Commander's should submit all VAVS Representative nominations in writing to PR/Programs Coordinator Anna Selman.

It is important for the Representative to obtain regularly scheduled volunteers with a specific assignment or occasional volunteers (people who volunteer for special activities). The Representative and Deputies (if possible), meet annually with the Head of the Voluntary Service at the facility for a joint review every November. All Posts that have activities and volunteers at a facility should clear the activity with the Jewish War Veterans Representative.

### **Purposes:**

- To fulfill our mission to help all veterans by volunteering our time at VA facilities.
- To encourage members, patrons, and community supporters to participate in VAVS volunteering and foster community.
